Meetings:


Parish Council meetings are normally held on the first Thursday of each month. Council meetings dealing with planning and general purpose issues are normally held on the third Thursday of each month (except for May, August and sometimes December). In the forthcoming year, the June meeting will be on the 3rd Thursday (18th June 2009) due to the European elections. Committee meetings are called as and when required.

Meetings are usually held at Burton Village Hall at 7.30 pm, with the Council meetings commencing with a Public Question Time when members of the public are invited to address the Council on any issue, over which it has a power. These arrangements are subject to confirmation at the Annual Meeting each year.

Members of the public are welcome to attend any of the Council and Committee meetings, except where it is notified that a particular item of business is exempt under the Public Bodies (Admission to Meetings) Act 1960.




Chairman's Overview of the Year

It has been another active year at Kirkburton Parish Council. The year started very well with the Council winning the British Renewable Energy Awards, Region category, for its new Microgeneration Policy, which is given to the best initiative or policy by local authorities or regional agencies to encourage take-up of renewable energy. The judge commented "This small parish appears to be doing more than our national Government."



Work in this direction continued by grant funding 50% of the costs of the solar panel installation at Burton Village Hall, and a feasibility study for a similar installation at Stocksmoor Village Hall. As well as contributing to a reduction in carbon emissions and energy savings in the Parish, the policy has also influenced other areas of the country – following press coverage of the policy in various publications, there have been numerous enquiries for information and requests for speakers on the policy. It would be nice to see similar policies springing up across the country and to know that Kirkburton has played at least a small part in that.



As well as looking to the future, the Council also cares about the past and the area's heritage. To this end my fellow Kirkburton ward members and I were pleased to see that as a result of our influence, Kirklees has made repairs to Highburton Cross. Before the work, the Cross was beginning to look rather precarious. We still feel the siting of the litter bin directly in front is entirely inappropriate. We're trying to persuade Kirklees of this view and have it moved to a less conspicuous spot.

I was also particularly pleased to see the old Council stained glass window, which used to be in Kirkburton Town Hall, installed into All Hallows Church, Kirkburton. It was blessed at the start of the Civic Sunday service. I started a new tradition this year by holding the Service as Evensong instead of a morning service. Most people seemed to approve and I would like to take the opportunity to thank all those who came and supported the White Rose Charity, both at the Civic Service and at various events held throughout the year.

Council continues to be vigilant in trying to safeguard the rural character and charm of the villages within the Parish for the future. Whilst not opposed to development per se, we feel that any changes and new buildings must fit in with what is here already, and not detract from the beautiful countryside, we all value so highly. With these aims in mind, the Council monitors most of the planning applications lodged in this area, making recommendations to Kirklees Planning Service, where the final decision is taken. Councillors have also been actively involved in discussions on the Local Development Framework, which will influence the development for many years to come. Unfortunately, however, we are not always successful in our representations. There was huge disappointment in the case of the Tesco Express store on North Road, Kirkburton. Having successfully won over the Kirklees Councillors, it was particularly

Summary of the Council's Activities and Decisions

Shelley Village Hall has seen some improvements over the last year. The old porch was demolished and the rear entrance upgraded, bringing it up to current standards and providing a new disabled entrance/exit. This will be most useful now that the village hall is to be used as an outreach post office. This proposal presented a challenge, but with the Community Association, Post Office and the Parish Council all working together, we have achieved this. All the Councillors were behind the idea from the start and together with the Clerk, they worked hard to overcome all the problems and deliver the service to the people of Shelley. It's good to see the village hall being put to such good use. Along with many other people, the Parish Council sent in a letter of full support to the Post Office's consultation.



Work at the village hall will continue in the coming year too, as Council has put more funding aside to cover further improvements, the details of which are currently being planned. And as the end of the existing lease approaches, much thought and discussion is taking place about the future of the building and the best way of retaining it for the community. The Parish Council recognises what an asset it is for all the many groups who use it and the community as a whole, so it is determined that the village hall will continue to be available to support the communities of the future. We are, of course, indebted to everyone at the Community Association for their commitment in looking after the hall on a regular basis, and keeping it in such a good condition. We look forward to a positive future in a more coherent relationship with the Community Association.

Kirkheaton Churchyard. The Council continues to work with the representatives of the Church regarding the maintenance of the churchyard. We are particularly grateful to the Unpaid Works Unit, who did a tremendous job in clearing all the overgrown trees from the section at the bottom. Council is also grateful to the contractor for tending the grass. We are working with the Kirklees Trees Officer to manage the trees, and further work may take place later this year. We are also liaising with the Vicar and various other organisations on the repair to the wall. It will hopefully be carried out in conjunction with the Church's extension work, to try and ensure the best use of resources and a co-ordinated finish to the job. Council would like to thank everyone at the Parochial Church Council for their ongoing assistance and willing co-operation.

Council's Website has seen some improvements and upgrading, and we know that more people are now coming to rely on this for regular information about the Parish Council and its activities. We are hoping to develop it further over the coming months.

At the moment we are trying to develop the Links Pages for community organisations in the Parish. If you would like your community website included, please send us a link and we would be happy to oblige. Likewise, we would be grateful if you would reciprocate with a link from your website to ours – this way we can all work together to improve communications and the flow of information.



Noticeboards have been put up in the villages not served by Area Committee ones as another means of communicating with the public. Hopefully they will also become a reliable source of information for everyone. We are willing to display notices for community groups to advertise your various events and fundraisers. Please contact the Clerk if you have something to display, and she will be happy to give you details of the appropriate keyholder.

Parish Council Role/Kirklees Review

The Parish Councillors are very much a part of the villages they represent. Many of them sit on committees of village organisations and feed information both ways, trying to ensure that the Parish Council supports the population wherever it can. It was particularly heartening therefore to read the many positive responses on the work of the Parish Council and its Councillors, which were sent in to Kirklees during the Review of Parish Councils. Comments such as "Without the support [of the Parish Council] the Group might well have collapsed some years ago", were very well received. Messages of praise and support were also received from various Kirklees Officers and Councillors. There were also, of course, some constructive criticisms and suggestions of different ways of working in the future. We are all looking forward to learning of the conclusions and when the Review is complete, the Council will consider all of the comments to see if there is any merit in changing any of its working practices in line with the suggestions put forward.

Representation

Both the Parish Council as a body and individual Councillors liaise with the Police Authority, Metro and the bus companies as well as many departments within Kirklees such as Housing, Planning, Highways, etc. The Kirkheaton members have spent a lot of time this year trying to solve the problem of the school bus stop and have been liaising with the school, Metro, First Bus and the residents, trying to find a compromise acceptable to all. As you will guess, this is not an easy task, but the Parish Council is very resilient and is doggedly pursuing this in the hope that a solution will be found.





Allotments are growing in popularity, and currently the Council is struggling to keep up with the increased demand. The Council has supported two petitions for the establishment of new allotment gardens in Shelley and Kirkburton and would like to establish them on land owned by Kirklees. Negotiations are currently in progress, but due to the complexity of the issue, it is likely to take some time before the matter can be resolved. The Council is also looking into other means of increasing the number of plots available, whilst attempting to keep the increased costs at a reasonable level for the precept-payer – not an easy equation!

The two allotment gardens we manage at present are being fairly well-used. Council has recently had the drive cleared at Shepley and a new tap installed, as the water supply had all but stopped. At Grange Moor there

have been quite a few changes in tenancies and we look forward to the new plots being equally well used when the new gardeners have settled in. One of the tenants, Mr Taylor (pictured right), has recently celebrated 50 years gardening at Grange Moor allotments – our heartfelt congratulations go to him.



Partnership Working

The Parish Council also works alongside other organisations in order to try and ensure that the views of its residents are heard. It continues to work with the two Kirklees Area Committees which cover this area, where Councillors provide local knowledge and information - one of their main strengths. The Councillors and Clerk also work with the other Parish and Town Councils in the district on issues of common interest. All take their roles very seriously and over the course of the year many of them have attended several training events, often in their own personal time, to improve their knowledge and expertise.

The Council's programme for hanging baskets and Christmas trees was slightly extended this year. New brackets were put up in Stocksmoor where 10 baskets were on display in the summer – bringing the total across the Parish up to 96, and the Parish Council included Farnley Tyas in its Christmas tree provision. The total number of trees provided in the Parish is now 10, one of which is supplied free of charge by Kirklees.

Schools in the Parish delivering bird boxes for them to put up in their grounds, as well as making a presentation to the Year 3 children on the newly-launched Sunflower Competition. All the children of that age group are invited to take part, and in September the flowers will be judged, with the one with the widest head taking the prize in each school. We look forward to reporting further on this later in the year.

There is also now a Public Session before Environment meetings when people can put forward their own ideas for projects, or voice opinions on the Committee's projects. The Committee would very much like to see this slot being used by the public. The meeting dates will be publicised in the newsletter, on the website and in the noticeboards.
